BEARS TRAVEL TO LAGRANGE LOOKING FOR THIRD VICTORY

BEAR HEADLINES

The Washington University football team (2-3, 0-0 UAA) looks to snap a three-game skid with a road game at LaGrange College. Game time is set for 1 p.m. (ET) in LaGrange, Ga. The Bears are coming off a 6-3 overtime loss at Rhodes College on Saturday.

A LOOK AT LAGRANGE

LaGrange College (0-5) has dropped its first five games of the season by an average of 42.2 points. LaGrange, which is making its football debut this fall, is averaging 145.5 yards of total offense per game while giving up 475.0 yards. The Panthers dropped their first game of the season, a 37-0 loss to Rhodes.

A LOOK AHEAD

Washington University plays its final road game of the season on Sat., Oct. 14 at the University of Chicago. Kickoff is set for 1 p.m. at Stagg Field in the Windy City.

UAA SUCCESS

The University Athletic Association (UAA) has had early season success, sporting an 12-6 (.667) overall record through four weeks: Carnegie Mellon (5-0), Case Western Reserve (3-1), Chicago (2-2), Washington U. (2-3).

SHAUGHNESSY EARNS HONOR

Senior defensive back **Joe Shaughnessy** earned University Athletic Association (UAA) Defensive Athlete of the Week honors for his performance at Rhodes. Shaughnessy made three tackles, including a tackle for lost yardage, and registered three pass breakups in the 6-3 overtime loss at Rhodes College. Shaughnessy and the defense allowed just 154 yards of total offense, including 36 yards on the ground.

BEARS PICKED TO WIN UAA

Washington University in St. Louis is the co-favorite to win the 2006 UAA championship, according to the Preseason Conference Coaches' Poll. Winners of four of the last five UAA titles, WU recorded two first-place votes and 13 points. Defending Association champion University of Chicago also earned two first-place votes and 13 points. Carnegie Mellon University and Case Western Reserve University finished tied for third place in the poll, garnering five points each.

FIELD GOAL STREAK

Washington University snapped a 15-game streak without a field goal when junior **Michael Elliott** connected from 31 yards out in the Bears' 6-3 overtime loss at Rhodes on Saturday. Ben Lambert connected on the last field goal for the Bears in 2004, a 23-yard kick at Washington & Jefferson on Nov. 11.

MORE ON ELLIOTT

The 31-yard field goal against Rhodes was junior **Michael Elliott's** first of his career. Elliott, who leads the Bears with 25 tackles, also leads the UAA in extra point percentage converting on 11 of 12 kicks (91.7%).

DEFENSE STANDING STRONG

Washington University's defense kept the Bears in the game at Rhodes despite the struggles on offense. The Bears allowed 154 yards of total offense against the Lynx. WU shut down the rushing attack for Rhodes, holding the Lynx to 36 yards on 30 carries. Washington U.'s defense ranks 22nd in Division III (216.6 ypg), and 26th in rushing defense (62.6 ypg).

SCORING MACHINE

The 61 points scored on Sept. 9 against Westminster College were the most points scored in the last 92 games and the fifth most in Washington University school history. The school record for most points scored in a game is 88, against McKendree College in 1938.

SENIOR SENSATION

Despite sitting out against Rhodes, senior defensive lineman **Drew Wethington** still leads the UAA in tackles for loss (2.66) and ranks seventh in Division III. *A Don Hansen's Football Gazette* Preseason All-America selection, Wethington leads the Bears in solo tackles (16), tackles for a loss (10.5) and sacks (2.5).

STOPPING THE RUN

Washington University's defense has allowed just seven players to break the century mark on the ground in the last 76 games. Nick Schey of

the University of Chicago (Oct. 5, 2005) was the last opponent to gain 100 or more yards on the ground against the Bears.

GROUND ATTACK

Washington University suffered just its second loss in the last three years when it outgains its opponents on the ground. The Bears had a 84-36 advantage on the ground in the 6-3 overtime loss at Rhodes on Saturday. Since 1999, Washington University is 34-7 (.829) when it gains more yards on the ground than its opponent. Below is WU's record the past seven seasons when outrushing its opponent:

and Robert followed older brothers Dan (1999-2002) and Kevin (2001-04).

CONSISTENCY

Washington University has posted a school-record 13 consecutive winning seasons, dating back to 1993. In 2005, Washington U. started the season 1-3 before winning five of six games to finish the season with a 6-4 overall record. The Bears have finished with a losing record just twice in 18 seasons under head coach **Larry Kindbom**. WU has finished the last four seasons and seven of the last nine with a 6-4 overall record.

ADDED SPECIAL TEAMS HELP

A week after freshman **Micah Anderson** returned two kickoffs for 55 yards, freshman **Matt Mangini** stepped in the role as punt returner against Rhodes. Mangini, who is a converted wide receiver after beginning the year as a quarterback, had a season-high return of 12 yards, and 11-yard and seven-yard returns in the loss.

SENIOR CLASS

Washington University has 26 seniors on this year's roster, marking the largest senior class in school history. Nine seniors will be in the starting lineup when the Bears take the field against LaGrange on Saturday. This year's senior class holds an overall record of 20-15 (.571) and has won two UAA championships.

STARS AND STRIPES

Washington University's 99-man roster features players from 24 different states. Missouri (24), Illinois (16) and Ohio (10) are the most represented, while California and Michigan have six apiece.

2006 CO-CAPTAINS

Seniors **Pat McCarthy**, **Joe Shaughnessy** and **Drew Wethington** have been chosen to serve as co-captains for the 2006 season. The trio has guided the Bears to a pair of UAA titles and a 6-4 record in each of their first three years on the Danforth Campus.

ATTENDANCE UP

Washington University had 2,816 fans attend the 2006 home opener against Westminster on Sept. 9. That marked the largest crowd at Francis Field since Oct. 20, 2001 against Rochester (2,856). Through two home games, the Bears are averaging 2,121 fans per game. A year ago, the Bears drew 5,081 fans over five home dates, an average of 1,270 fans per game.

RED ZONE SUCCESS

The Bears were 5-for-5 with five rushing touchdowns inside the red zone (20-yard line) in the 61-0 win over Westminster College on Sept. 9. For the season, WU is 10-of-15 (66.3%) in the red zone with eight rushing TDs. On the defensive side, WU's opponents are 13-of-14 (92.9%) with eight passing TDs.

GOLDEN FOOT

Senior **Chaz Moody** ranks first in the UAA and 24th in Division III with a 39.6 yards per punt average this season. Moody, a second-team all-UAA selection in 2004 and 2005, ranks eighth on the all-time WU list in career average (156 kicks, 5,731 yards, 36.7 avg.).

ACCURACY

Senior quarterback **Pat McCarthy** has connected on 50-71 (70.4%) of his passes through five games. The 70.4 completion percentage leads the UAA, while his 133.0 passing efficiency rating ranks third in the UAA. On Saturday at Rhodes, McCarthy was 10-of-14 for 68 yards. The single-season school record for pass completion percentage is .643 by Alan Barnett in 1998.

The Bears opened the 2006 season with a 21-6 win at Lake Forest College on Saturday afternoon in Lake Forest, Ill. The win for the Bears was their sixth-straight road victory dating back to last season.

The first two quarters were highlighted by the defense. Washington U.'s defense limited Lake Forest to 34 total yards on 20 plays, while the Bears racked up just 93 yards of total offense.

Washington U. came out passing early in the third quarter and it resulted into the first points of the season. Senior Pat McCarthy punched it in on a quarterback sneak from one-yard out with 8:31 left in the third quarter as the Bears jumped ahead 7-0. McCarthy was 6-of-10 for 70 yards on the drive.

The defense continued to shine in the third quarter as junior Michael Elliott and senior Drew Wethington sacked Lake Forest quarterback Jeff Ziemnik to push the ball back to the 16-yard line. Senior Travis Ferber blocked a punt on the ensuing play, and then senior Matt Balthazar recovered it and took it into the end zone to extend the lead to 14-0.

An interception by sophomore Adam Hartzler set up a three-yard touchdown run by senior Robbie Sutkay midway through the fourth quarter to make it 21-0.

The Bears defense held Lake Forest to 98 yards of total offense, and forced eight punts. WU's offense totaled 312 yards of total offense in the win, including 219 in the second half.

McCarthy finished the day 17-of-24 for 172 yards, while senior DaRonne Jenkins led the rushing attack with 53 yards on 15 carries. Junior Michael Casper added four catches for 69 yards. Wethington led the defensive unit with eight tackles, including five for loss. The meeting was the first between the two teams in 105 years. Washington U. upended Lake Forest, 11-0, in the teams' only other meeting in 1901.

The Bears scored 34 first half points en route to a 61-0 win over Westminster College in the 2006 home opener in front of 2,816 fans at Francis Field.

WU scored on the first play of the game after senior quarterback Pat McCarthy connected with junior Dan Cardone for a 64-yard touchdown pass. WU made it 14-0 early in the second quarter after senior Robbie Sutkay scored from one yard out.

Senior Drew Wethington intercepted Westminster quarterback Ryan Evers on the next Blue Jay possession and returned it 19 yards for the touchdown to extend the lead to 21-0 with 11:46 left in the second quarter.

The defense forced its fourth punt of the half, and the offense responded with a 13-play, 69-yard touchdown drive. Sutkay capped the drive with a one-yard plunge to push the lead to 28-0. An interception by senior Joe Shaughnessy set up a one-yard run by senior DaRonne Jenkins to make it 34-0 at half.

The Bears racked up 243 yards of total offense in the first half, while allowing Westminster to 40 yards on 22 plays.

WU made it 41-0 early in the third quarter after senior quarterback Nick Henry connected with junior Scottie Guthrie for a 28-yard TD pass. The touchdown was the first of Guthrie's career. Junior Nick Buckvar, junior Ian English and freshman David Williams added rushing TDs to round out the scoring.

McCarthy was sharp in his first start of season completing 8-of-10 passes for 130 yards and a touchdown. English led the ground attack for the Bears with 65 yards on five carries, while Cardone had four catches for a career-high 101 yards and a TD. The Bears totaled 391 yards of total offense in the win, including 215 yards through the air.

Washington U.'s defense held Westminster to 93 yards of total offense, marking the second-consecutive game the Bears have held their opponent under 100 yards.

The Bears suffered their first setback of the season in a 48-7 loss at No. 25 Wheaton College at McCully Field. The loss for the Bears snapped their six-game road winning streak, and their six-game overall winning streak dating back to last season.

Wheaton (2-0) scored on its first possession of the game after Jeremy Chupp connected with Noah Dreyer for a five-yard touchdown strike. Dreyer's TD capped a 12-play, 80-yard drive, as the Thunder jumped ahead 6-0.

The Thunder made it 14-0 with 2:02 left in the second quarter after Chupp hit Dreyer again for a 19-yard TD reception. Pete Itteragen picked off senior Pat McCarthy on the next Wheaton possession and returned it 13 yards for the touchdown to make it 21-0 at halftime.

Wheaton totaled 246 yards of total offense in the first half, including 156 through the air. The Thunder defense shut down the Bears running game, allowing six yards on 15 carries. WU totaled just 86 yards of total offense in the opening half.

Chupp extended the lead to 28-0 with 6:03 remaining in the third after hitting Jordan Kemper for a three-yard touchdown strike. Itteragen's second interception of the game set up a 15-yard touchdown pass from Chupp to Dreyer to make it 35-0.

McCarthy connected with junior Michael Casper on a five-yard TD pass with 1:05 remaining in the fourth quarter for the only score of the game for the Bears.

Wheaton outgained Washington U. 441-226 in total offense, and held the Bears to 64 yards rushing on 34 carries. McCarthy finished the day 10-of-15 for 113 yards and one touchdown, while Casper had four catches for 69 yards. Senior DaRonne Jenkins led the rushing attack for the Bears with 43 yards on 14 carries. Senior John Grit led the defensive unit with eight tackles.

Wheaton, which improved to 34-2 at home over the past six seasons, now leads the series between the two teams, 9-4.

The Bears team dropped a 34-15 decision at home to North Central College on Saturday night at Francis Field.

A 61-yard punt return by Anton Steinhart set up the first score of the game for North Central. Kam Kniss connected with Eric Stuedemann for a six-yard TD pass on a key third-down and goal to make it 7-0. The Cardinals forced a third-consecutive punt by the Bears, and North Central responded with a four-play, 51-yard drive capped by Wes Kostellic's one-yard run to make it 14-0. The Cardinals added a 31-yard field goal by Anthony Bagnanno to make it 17-0 at halftime.

North Central (2-1) had 159 yards of total offense in the first half, including Kniss' 107 yards through the air. Washington U. was limited to 105 yards on 27 plays in the first half, and punted four times.

The Bears suffered a tough 6-3 overtime loss at Rhodes College on Sept. 30 in Memphis, Tenn. With the loss, the Bears fell to 2-3 overall and dropped its third-consecutive defeat.

After a scoreless first three quarters, the Bears finally jumped ahead with 2:07 left in the game after a 31-yard field goal by junior Michael Elliott. The field goal was the first of Elliott's career, and also snapped the Bears' 15-game streak without a field goal.

With under a minute remaining, the Bears looked like they had secured a victory after Mark Oliver of Rhodes fumbled and it was picked up by sophomore Tommy Bawden. A 15-yard personal foul on the play gave the ball back to Rhodes, and they took advantage.

Mark Oliver connected with Ronald Bozant on a 21-yard pass to push the ball down to the Washington U. two-yard line, before Chris Catalanotto connected from 20 yards out to send the game to overtime.

In overtime, Catalanotto kicked a 34-yard field goal on Rhodes' first possession to make it 6-3. The Bears got the ball on the 25-yard line of Rhodes, but two penalties and a sack pushed the ball back to the Rhodes 42-yard line.

WU's defense was solid all afternoon allowing just 154 yards of total offense. The Bears shut down the rushing attack for Rhodes, holding them to 36 yards.

The Bears totaled 203 yards of total offense, led by DaRonne Jenkins 62 yards on 23 carries. Senior quarterback Pat McCarthy was 10-of-14 for 68 yards, while senior Nick Henry was 6-of-12 for 51 yards. Junior wide receiver Joe Lubelski had six catches for 58 yards, and juniors Scottie Guthrie and Dan Cardone added four catches apiece.

The win was Rhodes's first over the Bears since 2002, and gave the Lynx a 22-20-1 lead in the series.
